85% of youth said they would step up to bullying if given the right tools. Present in nearly 100 million homes, Cartoon Network wants to play a role in providing the tools to stop bullying.

What is Stop Bullying: Speak Up?

Cartoon Network's *Stop Bullying: Speak Up* is a multi-platform, pro-social initiative launched in October 2010 that focuses on motivating bystanders to speak up and help prevent bullying.

Stop Bullying: Speak Up works to send a clear message to its national viewership and others that bullying is unacceptable and that there are safe, effective ways young people can make a difference.

Why did Cartoon Network develop this campaign?

Stop Bullying: Speak Up was created as a direct response to the expressed concerns of Cartoon Network's audience of youth ages 6-14. Young people said that bullying was among the biggest problems they faced. While youth felt they could not impact the recession or war, they expressed that bullying was a problem they believed they could solve if they had some help.

Cartoon Network mobilized quickly and recruited experts in bullying prevention from academia, government, and community-based organizations to determine the role Cartoon Network could play.

- The Launch of the Stop Bullying: Speak Up Social Pledge App an interactive social media pledge that enables educators, parents and students to make a personal commitment—and recruit others to join them—to help stop bullying

- Engaging Governors to Pledge to Speak Up to Bullying Maryland Governor Martin O'Malley and First Lady Katie O'Malley took the pledge before 500+ high schoolers and challenged governors across the nation to do the same, prompting action from VT, MA and Guam.
